## Equipment for worm egg counting

All the equipment below (and more) is part of the worm egg counting kit from EggsAct.

- Microscope –preferably binocular
- Worm Egg Counting chamber
- A few containers
- 20ml and 3ml syringes and pipette

## Dung collection

You will need to collect and bring in some dung samples (1 at a minimum but 2-3 is ideal) from your sheep and/or goats to use on the day at our worm egg counting workshops. Please collect your samples preferably the day before the workshop.
