


New Queensland drought assistance is available to eligible primary producers across all industries. The assistance helps producers prepare their business for drought and other climate events and build business resilience. The new assistance measures replace the Drought Relief Assistance Scheme (DRAS). Freight subsidies for transporting fodder, water and livestock will no longer be available if you are drought-declared after 1 April 2022. You don't need to be drought-declared to access the new assistance. For details on the new drought assistance measures visit: daf.qld.gov.au/droughtassist.

Current drought assistance




*Whether used for drought ready and / or drought recovery activities, the total maximum lend is \$250,000

To apply for Queensland drought assistance grants and low and no interest loans through QRIDA you will need a Farm Business Resilience Plan.

A business plan can help you navigate uncertainty and provide you and others (e.g. banks, lenders, market players) with the confidence that your business is headed in the right direction. If you're looking to grow or change your business, a current business plan is invaluable.
